THE VENETO REGION

Our Itinerant Reporter visits two interconnecting provinces of the Veneto Region: the province of Padua and the province of Venice.

When visiting Padua and surrounding areas by car, it is best to stay outside the city, as parking can be a problem. Some suggestions will be given at the end.

DISCOVERING PADUA AND ITS PROVINCE

"For the great desire I had To see fair Padua, nursery of arts,..." in The

Taming of the Shrew by William Shakespeare

As you stroll along Padua's streets you can see a bustling city combining past and present, ancient charm full of history, culture and art with the vibrancy and vitality of a modern metropolis, and dynamic university life. It is home to the oldest Botanical Gardens in the World and the second oldest university in Italy (1222), where Galileo Galilei taught mathematics and Fabricius of Acquapendente constructed the first Anatomical Theatre. It is a city rich in intellectual resources. Special cultural events and festivals run periodically throughout the year (see tourist board website).

Like so many cities in Italy, one visit is never enough. This means the traveller needs to make some choices. A must is the Scrovegni Chapel (1303-1305), a precursor to the Sistine Chapel in miniature with frescos by Giotto and other artists. It illustrates under a blue starry sky the life of Mary, the life of Jesus and the story of the Passion ending with the imposing vision of the Last Judgement.



The visit begins with an initial video explaining the history of the chapel and how it was saved from destruction by the state when it was discovered to have Giotto's work. It was a private chapel attached to the mansion of



the Scrovegni family, who became empoverished and could no longer afford to keep their property.

The chapel stands in a complex, known as Musei Civici agli Eremitani in Piazza Eremitani off Corso Garibaldi, which includes the Archaeology Museum and the Museum of Medieval and Modern Art. They are also worth a visit and the layout is impressive. Tickets should be booked well in advance both for the chapel and museums, as only a certain number of visitors are allowed per day. One cannot just turn up on the spot. Another museum close by is Palazzo Zuckermann for antique furniture, Venetian lace, coins and other works of art. Entrance tickets for this museum are also bought from the Musei Civici agli Eremitani.



Padua is also a city of religious heritage with its numerous churches. The ones, which stand out most, are the Basilica of St. Anthony and the Basilica of St. Giustina, both offering unusual architecture outside and inside. The Basilica of St. Anthony emits an incredible peaceful atmosphere and feeling of space. Close by stands Basilica della Valle,

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just off the magnificent round square of Prato della Valle, surrounded by a small canal bordered by two rings of statues. It is worth getting a Padova Card to move about the city more freely.

Besides this fascinating mix of historic and new, Padua is blessed by beautiful surrounding landscape on its outskirts with its spas (Terme Euganee of Abano and Montegrotto) and the Euganean Hills, now part of a protected area known as Colli Euganei Regional Park. It stands in an ideal location being less than an hour away from Venice, and over an hour from Verona. There is a good railway network. However, if travelling by car, it is best to stay outside the city, as parking can be a problem. Staying at an *agriturismo* is an ideal way to relax and is normally close to motorways offering easy access to travel to other areas.

In Italy, most agriturismo holidays are in farm house resorts, which are suitable for the whole family. Often, pets are also welcome. Many *agriturismi* are high-end offering different types of accommodation, such as B&B or self-catering apartments. *Agriturismo* proved a boost for rural farmers who could no longer rely solely on their farms' output for income. At least a million tourists visit Italy annually to enjoy the scenic countryside in *agriturismo* lodgings.

An *agriturismo* with a good location and excellent service is Agriturismo Ae Cavane, a working farm 6 km from Codevigo and a 22-minute drive from the sandy beaches in Chioggia. It features bicycle rental and free WiFi throughout. Pets are welcome. The air conditioned rooms and apartments are furnished in country style with parquet floors and wooden beamed ceiling. Self-catering apartments include a fully equipped kitchen. Guests of Ae Cavane Agriturismo have access to a garden with barbecue facilities and free parking on site. It is run by a charming couple, owners Barbara and Ettore.



The city of Venice can be reached in 45 minutes by car. Padua is about 36 kilometres away and the Delta del Po nature protection area is 25 km from Ae Cavane. Check with owners how to get there as soon as you arrive at Codevigo as it can be a bit complicated. See website:

THE BRENTA RIVIERA

"...un luogo delizioso fra quei magnifici palaggi che adornano il fiume Brenta, e che formano una delle più belle villeggiature d'Italia." Words taken from L'Arcadia in Brenta by Carlo Goldoni

The charm and extraordinary beauty of the Brenta Riviera is breathtaking. It is a combination of history, culture, art and exquisite scenery along the banks of the River Brenta, a natural extension of Venice's Grand Canal, which flows from Padua to the Venetian Iagoon linking the two cities together by waterway.

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From the 16th to the 18th century, many Venetian aristocratic families built their beautiful villas here (the famous Ville Venete, such as Villa Foscari, also known as La Malcontenta in Malcontenta, Villa Barchessa Valmarana in Mira, Villa Widmann-Foscari in Mira, Villa Ferretti-Angeli in Dolo and Villa Pisani in Stra). Many of the villas are in the Palladian style, and a few were designed by Andrea Palladio himself and by his pupil Vincenzo Scamozzi.



The villas, surrounded by parks, tiny villages and parish churches, contain a number of art treasures by local artists and painters from other parts of Italy, including names such as Sansovino, Zelotti, Demin, Benedetto Cagliari and others.

Unfortunately many villas had frescos on the outside, which were later wiped off as they were considered a luxury and thus heavily taxed. Likewise, internal paintings were also eliminated if directly attached to the wall. These were replaced by removable paintings, which could be taken off and sold. In the 19th century, hard times hit these noble families, some of whom had to sell not only their treasures, but also their villas, which became too expensive to run.



The beautiful Villa Valmarana had to be partly demolished leaving two granaries transformed into a farm and inn in order to downgrade the value of the property.



It was later sold, but is among the few villas, which are still in private hands and, like many stately homes, hosts wedding receptions and exhibitions to enable the family to keep it. See website: www.villavalmarana.net

The best and most grandiose of these abodes is Villa Pisani in Stra with its magnificent façade and rooms, park, fountains and long pool, statues, orangerie, stables and maze. It was primarily built as a status symbol showing off the power achieved by the Pisani family, since one of them, Alvise Pisani, was appointed doge of Venice in 1735.



When it was built the building had 114 rooms. The most important room is the "Napoleon Room" and its adjacent bathroom, furnished with pieces from the Napoleonic and Habsburg periods and others from the Pisani period. The villa experienced moments of glory, but then passed from one owner to another.



In 1807 it was bought by Napoleon from the Pisani Family, who fell into poverty due to great losses in gambling.

In 1814 the building became the property of the House of Habsburg and the villa transformed into a place of vacation for the European aristocracy of that period.

In 1934 it was partially restructured to host the first meeting of Adolf Hitler and Benito Mussolini, after the riots in Austria.

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It is now owned by the State and is also known as Villa Pisani Museo Nazionale. The area surrounding the Naviglio del Brenta, a channel from the Brenta River, is navigable by riverboats, whose best example is the famous Burchiello, a Venetian barge, which once used to carry Venetian noble families from Venice to the countryside and Padua. More traditional and romantic boats, known as the "burchi" (old wooden barges) were even mentioned by Dante Alighieri in his Divine Comedy. Among other important visitors fascinated by the charming landscape was Lord Byron who spent a few months at Villa Foscarini (1817-1818) in Mira.

The best way to visit the Palladian villas offering a harmonious connection between architecture and landscape is to go on a boat cruise along the River Brenta, which passes through swiveling bridges and locks. If you are lucky to have a sunny day, it is an ideal way to relax and enjoy the extraordinary backdrop imagining what it used to be like cruising on the once horse-drawn barges and being lifted up and down the locks.



DELTA TOUR organise excellent cruises. Their members of staff are helpful and polite, in particular the guide and Captain Diego. They offer an exquisite fish based lunch in a harmony of flavours combining local cuisine and wine, making your journey an unforgettable one. Book well in advance as they are often full and do not always navigate every day depending on the time of the year and the starting point varies between Padua or Venice.

VENICE, THE CITY LACED TOGETHER BY ISLANDS



This unique city is made up of 118 small islands separated by canals and linked by 400 bridges. Hence, it is no wonder that it has been called "La Dominante," "Serenissima," "Queen of the Adriatic, " "City of Water," "City of Masks," "City of Bridges," "The Floating City," and "City of Canals." It reached a peak when the Republic of Venice became an important financial and maritime power during the Middle Ages and the Renaissance period making it the first real international financial centre. It was also a major centre for trade and art in the 13th century right up to the end of the 17th century, not to forget music and the famous composer Antonio Vivaldi.



To visit Venice under a clear blue sky and be taken up the Grand Canal past Ponte di Rialto right to St Mark's square is extraordinary and should be experienced at least once in a lifetime. St Mark's Square with its Basilica and neighbouring Bridge of Sighs are amazing. Gondolas come in and out of side canals trying to avoid choppy waves from water buses and taxis.



Once on terra ferma, this beautiful city is congested by flocks of tourists, who fill up the narrow streets, squares and bridges making it

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
almost impossible to walk. Mega cruise ships are now allowed to dock in Venice's lagoon pouring out thousands of day-trippers, in addition to the Venice Biennale and Venice Carnival. Most shops and restaurants seem to cater only for visitors with tourist prices. The city was not built to hold such a large capacity. Venice needs to save its identity and live a normal life, where its cultural heritage can be appreciated at a normal pace.



The starting points for the visit to Venice are Piazzale Roma and Venice's central railway station right on the opposite side of the canal. They are the gateway to Venice where one can buy a Venezia Unica City Pass to board the water bus known as the vaporetto. Venice's official city pass, part of AVM Holding S.p.A., offers other services for Venice, such as access to museums and events. SHAKESPEARE IN ROME

An evening stroll in Villa Borghese, Rome's largest park, near the area known as the Belle Arti leads to the city's Globe Theatre. I was curious to discover Shakespeare in Rome and that there is an actual replica of the Globe Theatre. It is a full-scale reproduction of Shakespeare's Globe Theatre, copied from the original designs, and almost identical to the one that now stands on London's South Bank. It was built in 2003 by the council and financed by the Silvano Toti Foundation. The late Silvano Toti was a patron of the arts. Art direction is by Gigi Proietti.

The theatre is designed in a circular shape with a stage that juts out into the middle of the audience, and an open roof, which is better suited to Rome's hot weather than it is to London. It is built of oak and has a capacity of 1250, including standing space in the pit in front of the stage, which is the cheapest place to watch the performance. Many university students bring cushions to sit in the pit.

As in London, actors at times move off the stage and mingle with the audience. A major part of the enjoyment of the Globe is the intimacy of the theatre, where the audience surrounds the stage and is close to the action. It is a shared experience, where communication between actor and audience and the story telling of the play and the characters are more immediate than in a conventional theatre.

I went to see Macbeth in Italian. The diction was clear, making it easy for me to follow. The actors let their thoughts be expressed by their gestures. They showed empathy and full immersion in the characters they were portraying. It is this form that involves and draws the audience into the spirit of the play.

Most of the action takes place under the cover of nightfall foretelling a sinister omen. A chilling atmosphere of doom and gloom hovers over the story. While Macbeth and Lady Macbeth drive the action of the play, Lady Macbeth is the leading character. Macbeth played by Giacinto Palmarini, and Lady Macbeth played by Melania Giglio, who lets herself be physically possessed by the ruthless woman she is portraying, give a fantastic performance of involvement and passion as they let ambition devour them both in body and soul.

Excellent production and choreography, including good acting and sound effects create such a memorable impact that one does not need to understand Italian to appreciate the play. The atmosphere is outstanding and educational, where visual gestures bring the characters to life. You really feel you are in involved in Shakespeare's theatre of universal characters of all ages. Italian translations of Shakespeare's plays are studied at schools and universities all over Italy. The mysterious link between Shakespeare and Italy goes on as a literary love affair.

As a fellow school boy from Warwickshire, I was eager to learn the merits of Shakespeare and often went to the Royal Shakespeare Theatre at Stratford-upon-Avon. I can thoroughly recommend this production as one of the best performances and interpretations I have ever seen.

Most plays at the Rome Globe are performed in modern Italian, although there are some English language productions. The season runs from June until October.

ANCIENT ROME BROUGHT ALIVE THROUGH SPECIAL EFFECTS AND VIR-TUAL REALITY

amazed by the outstanding performance and educational experience.

Walking along Via dei Fori Imperiali, the road in the centre of the city of Rome running across the Forum of Augustus and the Forum of Caesar and linking the Colosseum to Piazza Venezia, is an awesome experience in the daytime. Then to go back there in the evening and suddenly find the ruins come to life and see what it was like in the days of ancient Rome is truly magical.

Journeys through Ancient Rome, two stories and two routes, a project conceived by well known documentary science journalist Piero Angela and physicist Paco Lanciano in 2014 is a great way to spend a hot summer's evening outside. The show begins at nightfall. By creatively using the remains of the Forum of Caesar and the Forum of Augustus, the latest technology using spotlights and projections brings to life ancient stones, which speak for themselves through videos and faithful reconstruction of the area. The visits evoke life in ancient Rome under two leading figures.

Our visit began with the Forum of Augustus. Here the audience watches unfolding scenes accompanied by a narrator, who explains the significance of the buildings and events in that period. Headsets are provided and the listener can tune into different languages. The show lasts about an hour.

Depending on the time of the year and when nightfall occurs, it is possible to attend both performances one after the other as the Forum of Caesar is close by. We followed this option and found it a good combination, although, chronologically speaking, we would have expected to go to Julius Caesar's Forum before going to the Augustus Forum. We were



Access to the Forum of Caesar begins on a walkway through Trajan's Forum leading to an underground tunnel of the Imperial Fora. Visitors carry their headphones with them as they are taken on a walk with a guide to help follow the route. As before, projections use existing walls and columns as a backdrop to recreate monuments, government buildings and statues, which stood there many centuries ago. These are always accompanied by light and sound effects, whilst a narrator explains the story.

Spectators are introduced to the excitement of daily life in Ancient Rome, when officials, plebeians, soldiers, consuls and senators strolled under the arches of the Forum. Ancient *taberne* reappear among these colonnades, used as offices and shops of the Forum.



Another evening, we went to see L'ARA COM'ERA, where the Ara Pacis, the monument commissioned in Rome by Augustus to celebrate peace, comes to life in 3D. The spectator wearing 3D headgear initially sits for an introduction and then walks around accompanied by a virtual narrator. The ARA PACIS is recreated in its original 360 degrees glory. Augustus, in his spiritual testimony, the Res Gestae, tells us of the Senate's decision to construct an altar to Peace. The ceremonial dedication of the Altar of Peace took place on 30th January 9 B.C. It was built on the Field of Mars, which had recently been urbanised, and on which traditionally the manoeuvres of the infantry and the cavalry took place, and, in more recent times, the gymnastic exercises of the Roman vouth.

The experience of feeling fully immersed and walking around Campus Martius as it was during the days of Augustus, being surrounded by Romans wearing their togas, watching the sacrificial scene performed by actors and capturing the intense colours that once enriched the original reliefs is an amazing experience. Although the 3D equipment resolution needs to be improved, it is still worth a visit to compare what the white marble Ara Pacis looks like today and how it used to be before losing its colours after being buried for so many years under layers of soil and building. Present day Rome is the result of overlapping layers of fresh building work through the centuries. Hence it is no surprise that new archaeological sites are constantly being discovered.



CAFFÈ AMARO

"Drinking bitter coffee brings passion and love"

Caffè amaro, a novel published by Feltrinelli in Italian in 2016 is another bestseller by Italo-British author Simonetta Agnello Horby. It is a love story full of passion set in Sicily in the early twentieth century.

When Maria, a 15-year-old girl coming from a family with great ideals but with no means, meets Pietro for the first time she is so scared that she does not dare ask for sugar to put in her coffee. From that moment onwards, she will always have bitter coffee.

Baron Pietro Sala, 34, falls in love with her at first sight, asking for her hand in marriage. He loves traveling, women and gambling.

During a trip to Tripoli, Maria finds out what relates her to her friend Giosué, whom she has always considered like a brother. From that moment on they will start a secret relationship lasting twenty years.

The story is set in an imaginary village called Camagni, and spans a period that goes from the beginning of fascism to the bombings that destroy Palermo. Simonetta Agnello Hornby focuses on her main character, her story and her personal decisions in a crucial period of the history of Sicily and Italy.

CANALETTO AND THE ART OF VENICE

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
